

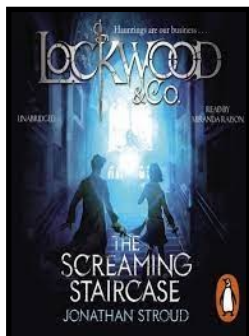

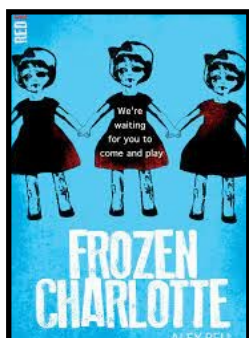

Lockwood and Co: The Screaming Staircase

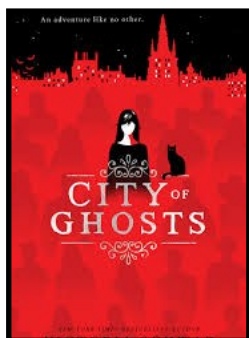

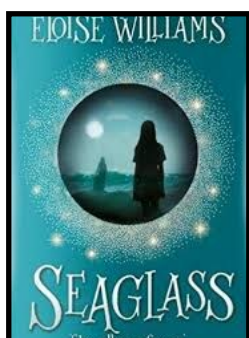
Frozen Charlotte M Alex Bell

City of Ghosts Victoria Schwab

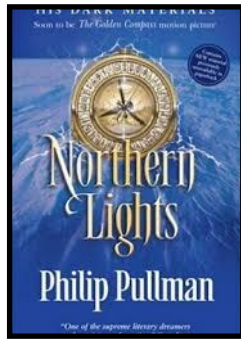

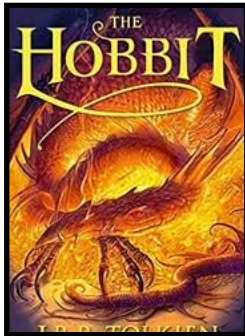

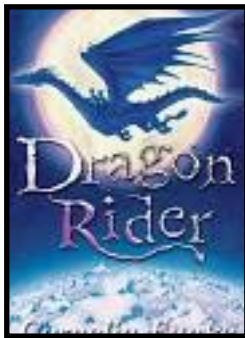


The Hobbit

Death and the Arrow

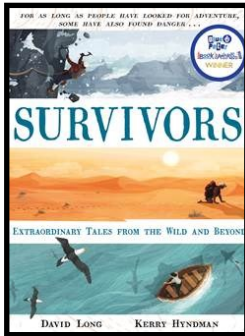

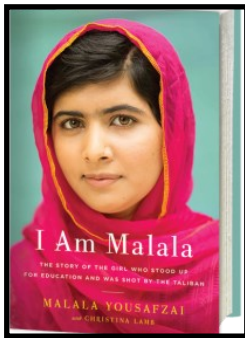
The Diary of a Young Naturalist Dara McAnulty

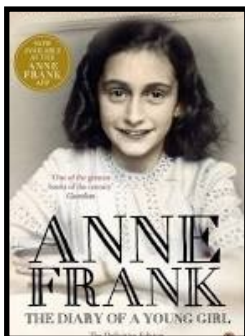
Survivors David Long

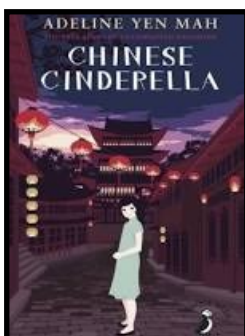
I am Malala M Malala Yousafzai

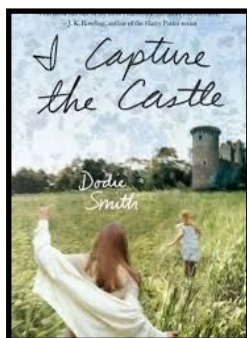
The Woman In Black E M Susan Hill

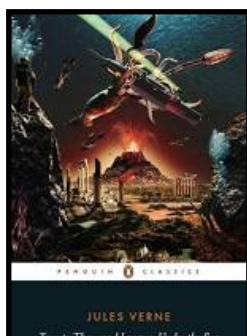
The Call of the Wild E Jack London

A love story set in 1930s England that follows 17-year-old Cassandra Mortmain, and the fortunes of her eccentric family, struggling to survive in a decaying English castle.

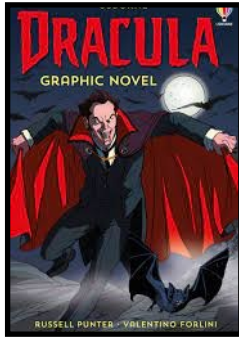


Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea E Jules Verne

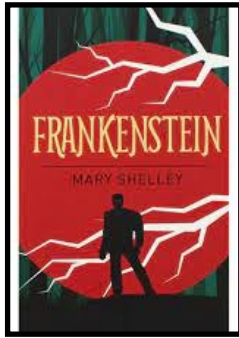
Roll of Thunder Hear, My Cry

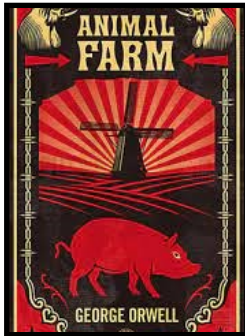

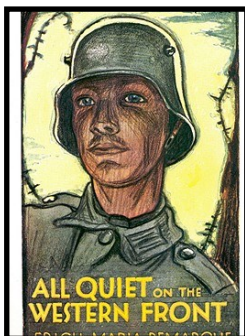


Treasure Island

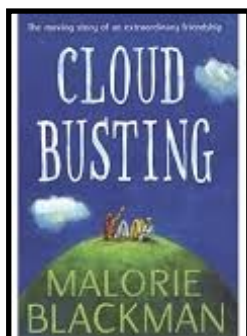
The Raven (Narrative Poem) E Edgar Allan Poe

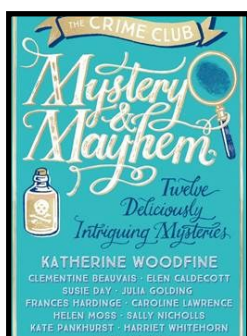
The Highwayman (Narrative Poem) E Alfred Noyes

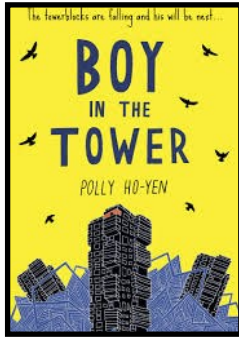


Once Morris Gleitzmann

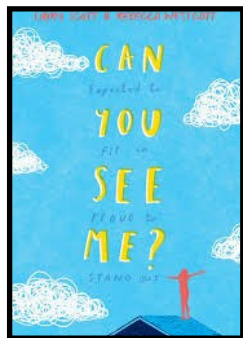


Ghost : M Jason Reynolds
